





This is an account of Tūhoe involvement in the battle of Ōrākau in the New Zealand wars by Sir William Te Rangiua 'Pou' Temara. Written in te reo Māori and based on oral sources, Tā Pou asks the big questions about those from Tūhoe who went to fight with Ngāti Maniapoto at Ōrākau.

**Tā William Te Rangiua 'Pou' Temara** KNZM is a professor of Māori Philosophy at Te Whare Wānanga o Awanuiārangi. He is current chair of the Repatriation Advisory Panel at Te Papa and sits on Kīngi Tūheitia's 'Council of Twelve'. He became a Knight Companion of the New Zealand Order of Merit in 2021.

#### Longing, fragility, romance and other tidal forces collide.


In 'Clockwatching', Sarah Lawrence hurtles us into a world full of friends and homes and things, and wonders what they all might leave behind: 'If it's toothache or budget / margarine or perhaps / another world altogether.' harold coutts' 'longing' reflects on gender ('if gender is a taste i am cutting out my tongue'), bodies ('pubelessness') and the rest ('there isn't a manual on when you're writing someone a love poem and they break up with you'). And in 'river poems' Arielle Walker steps right into the water – because 'a poem is a fluid thing all wrapped up in fish skin' – and finds stories of sealskins, harakeke and thistle, kānuka and mānuka, alder and elder.

Brimming with vivid beauty, the contemporary and the inflections of memory, *AUP New Poets 9* shows just what new writing can open up.

**Sarah Lawrence** (she/her) is a Pōneke-based poet, performer and musician. Her writing has appeared in *Starling*, *Landfall*, *A Fine Line* and *The Spinoff*.

**harold coutts** is a poet and writer based in Te Whanganui-a-Tara. Their work can be found across various New Zealand literary journals.

#### BITER

Claudia Jardine

## Ancient Greek epigrams drive a bitingly contemporary first poetry collection.

Filled with hickeys, puttanesca and tart wit, *BITER* is an apt title for Claudia Jardine's debut collection of verse. Fresh translations of erotic Greek epigrams are threaded through boozy sonnets, ecstatic odes and startlingly vulnerable love poems. Jardine weaves ancient and modern together into a rich, glitzy, idiosyncratic tapestry – and in doing so crafts a poetic voice that is at once classical and frisky.

**Claudia Jardine** has an MA in classics with distinction from Victoria University of Wellington, where she won the 2020 Alex Scobie Research Prize and a Marsden Grant for Masters scholarship. Her first chapbook, 'The Temple of Your Girl', was published in *AUP New Poets 7*. Her ancestors are from the British Isles and the Maltese Archipelago, and she lives in Ōtautahi.

'She's sharp, critical, iconoclastic, sexy, frank and funny – often all of these in one poem. And while love and sexuality are the dominant themes there is nothing it seems that Claudia can't write poetry about – spilt pasta, raisinhood, her father's mishandling of cheese wrapping, German kitchen technology, contemporary auspices.' – Anna Jackson

## Face to the Sky




#### A new collection by award-winning poet Michele Leggott.

In her latest poetry collection, Michele Leggott speaks to the art and writings of nineteenth-century New Zealand painter Emily Cumming Harris. *Face to the Sky* tells stories of love and loss from two women in the shadow of the same mountain, more than a century apart.

Face to the Sky is **Michele Leggott**'s eleventh poetry collection. Her selected poems, Mezzaluna, was co-published in 2020 by Wesleyan and Auckland University Presses. Earlier titles include Vanishing Points (2017) and Heartland (2014), both from Auckland University Press. She was the New Zealand Poet Laureate 2007–2009 and received the Prime Minister's Award for Literary Achievement in Poetry in 2013. In 2017 she was elected a Fellow of the Royal Society of New Zealand.

In Michele's work the reader trusts herself to the text, to its musicality and increasingly to a pervasive tenderness. If you can't be quite certain where the next poem will take you – it might suddenly elevate like a hot air balloon and you are above the domestic, above the bugle signalling a retreat to St. Mary's church, and there is a baby lifted wet from his bath, and everyone running, as in a Bruegel painting – you can be confident that the poet is holding the reins. What it says in the end is that everything counts.' — Elizabeth Smither


## One historian's research and the transformation of te Tiriti in New Zealand life.

Ruth Ross is hardly a household name, yet most New Zealanders today owe the way they understand the Treaty of Waitangi — or te Tiriti o Waitangi as Ross called it — to this remarkable woman's path-breaking historical research.

Taking us on a journey from small university classes and a lively government department in the nation's war-time capital to an economically poor but culturally rich Māori community in the far north, and from tiny schools and cloistered university offices to parliamentary committees and a legal tribunal, Attwood enables us to grasp how and why the place of the Treaty of Waitangi in New Zealand law, politics, society and culture has been transformed in the last seven decades.

**Bain Attwood** is a professor of history at Monash University in Melbourne and is the author of several books. He has held fellowships at the Australian National University and Cambridge University and a visiting professorship at Harvard University. *Empire and the Making of Native Title* was the joint winner of the New Zealand Historical Association's 2021 W.H. Oliver Prize, and was shortlisted for the 2022 Ernest Scott Prize.




## How the rotations of planet Earth shape the lives of humans and other animals.

This book takes the reader on a journey across a broad vista of science to make sense of the mysteries of biological time. How do the rotations of our planet shape our biology? What did human sleep cycles look like before artificial light? What happens to a person's waking and sleeping if they spend weeks in a dark cave? How adaptable are we to today's 24/7 living?

Humans are relative latecomers in the story of life on Earth but we often think that technology has freed us from its constraints. Written by a world-leading chronobiologist, *Night Owls and Early Birds* illuminates the fascinating science of biological time and offers a stark warning to anyone giving up on a night's sleep to get more out of their busy waking hours.

Philippa Gander is a professor emeritus at Massey University and an internationally recognised scholar of sleep and circadian rhythms. After a PhD at the University of Auckland and research at Harvard University Medical School and the NASA Ames Research Center, Gander was the inaugural director of the Sleep/Wake Research Centre at Massey University. In 2009 she was elected a Fellow of the Royal Society of New Zealand and in 2017 she was appointed an Officer of the New Zealand Order of Merit, for services to the study of sleep and fatigue.

Scattered like dandelion seeds,


from the grating city,

She is a poet, journalist and illustrator, working on Instagram under the name @maori\_mermaid. Her previous work has appeared in *Landfall, Starling, The Big Idea* and *The Pantograph Punch*.

## Secret History

State Surveillance in New Zealand, 1900–1956




#### The first volume in a history of spies and spying in New Zealand.

In 1900, a handful of New Zealand police detectives watched out for spies, seditionists and others who might pose a threat to state and society. The first of two volumes chronicling the history of state surveillance in New Zealand, *Secret History* opens up the 'secret world' of security intelligence through to 1956. It is the story of the surveillers who – in times of war and peace, turmoil and tranquillity – monitored and analysed perceived threats to national interests. It is also the story of the surveilled: those whose association with organisations and movements led to their public and private lives being documented in secret files.

**Richard S. Hill** is the author of four books on the history of policing in New Zealand and two on Crown–Māori relations in the twentieth century. He is a Life Member of Clare Hall, Cambridge University, and Emeritus Professor at the Stout Research Centre for New Zealand Studies at Victoria University of Wellington/Te Herenga Waka.

**Steven Loveridge** is a historian whose research focuses on governance, security intelligence and war and society. The author of several books, he has been published in various scholarly journals and anthologies. He is a research fellow with the Security and Surveillance Project at the Stout Research Centre for New Zealand Studies at Victoria University of Wellington/Te Herenga Waka.

A te reo Māori translation of Shakespeare's tragic drama of young love between two feuding families.

**William Shakespeare** (1564–1616) was a playwright, poet and actor. He is considered the most influential writer in the English language: his plays have been translated into almost every language and are performed in schools and theatres more often than any other playwright.

Born by the sea in Tauranga Moana and raised in Ruatoki in the nation of Tūhoe, **Te Haumihiata Mason** (Tūhoe, Ngāti Pango, Te Arawa) has spent a lifetime devoted to te reo Māori. Persuaded by

Tīmoti Kāretu to attend university in her 30s, Te Haumihiata went on to become a lecturer at Waikato

University and then worked for many years at Te Taura Whiri, eventually becoming Kaitiaki Reo and a

national authority on the language.

#### An essential new anthology of our best Māori short fiction.


Hiwa is a vibrant, essential collection of contemporary Māori short stories, featuring twenty-seven writers working in English or te reo Māori. The writers range from famous names and award winners – Patricia Grace, Witi Ihimaera, Whiti Hereaka, Becky Manawatu, Zeb Nicklin – to emerging voices like Shelley Burne-Field, Jack Remiel Cottrell, Anthony Lapwood and Colleen Maria Lenihan.

A showcase of contemporary talent, Hiwa includes biographical introductions for each writer's work, and explores the range of styles and subjects in the flourishing world of Māori fiction.

Named for Hiwa-i-te-rangi, the ninth star of Matariki, signifying vigorous growth and dreams of the year ahead, this anthology reveals the flourishing world of Māori writing today, in Aotearoa and beyond.

**Paula Morris** MNZM (Ngāti Wai, Ngāti Manuhiri, Ngāti Whātua) is an award-winning novelist, story writer and essayist from Auckland. She is an associate professor at the University of Auckland, where she is the director of the Master of Creative Writing.

**Darryn Joseph** (Ngāti Maniapoto) is an associate professor at Massey University. He has published more than twenty books, and written numerous resources for immersion education, including textbooks, chapter books and journal articles.

Francis Pound With a Foreword and Afterword by Leonard Bell

## The first substantial monograph on the art of one of this country's most influential artists, Gordon Walters.

In this remarkable study by the late Francis Pound, author of the landmark *Invention of New Zealand*, we are introduced to the making of a New Zealand modernist – tracing the work of Gordon Walters (1919–1995) from student charcoal sketches in the 1930s to the revelation of the mature Koru works at the 1966 New Vision Gallery exhibition in Auckland.


Pound follows Walters through steps and missteps, explorations and diversions, travel in Aotearoa and overseas, as the artist discovers new forms, invents others and discards many more. Pound looks hard at the paint, the brushes, the rulers, the scrapbooks, to reveal an artist at work. And, resolutely internationalist like the artist, the author provides not only astute insights into Walters' art, but also a guide to the elements and ideas that informed the work – notably, Māori and Pacific art, surrealism, Mondrian, De Stijl, the Bauhaus and Euro-American abstraction, conceptual art and minimalism.

With Francis Pound accompanying us through the work as guide, critic, wit and enthusiast, *Gordon Walters* is an extraordinary journey into twentieth-century art.

**Dr Francis Pound** (1948–2017) was a New Zealand art historian, curator and writer. He taught for some years in the art history department of the University of Auckland before becoming an independent art curator and writer.

Leonard Bell is an independent art and cultural historian based in Auckland.

Part philosophy thesis and part psychosexual Ancient Greek fever dream, Dani Yourukova's *Transposium* adapts Plato into poetry, featuring queer longing, a choose-your-own-adventure apocalypse, *Les Misérables* slash fiction and love poems about dead philosophers.

Shameless, witty and hot with curiosity, these poems are preoccupied with the refashioning of gender, logic, language and form. Through relentless cross-examination of Socrates and associates, Yourukova combines reckless affection for the past, and a shimmering spectrum of anxieties around an uncertain future.

**Dani Yourukova** is 'a queer Wellington writer with great hair and a bad personality' who completed their MA at Victoria University. Their work has been published in *takahē*, *Stasis Journal*, *The Spinoff*, *Turbine* | *Kapohau* and *Poetry New Zealand Yearbook*.



To remember a poem is to go freely, without your keys, your bag, your baggage, yet to possess a valuable taonga. It's the ability to speak a poem out loud, to yourself, to the air, to your folks. There's a reason we say 'off by heart' when we commit words to memory: to remember a poem is to hold that poem close to your heart.'

In haka and waiata, sea shanties and ballads, in the words of Sam Hunt and Selina Tusitala Marsh, Hone Tuwhare and Hera Lindsay Bird, the rhythms of poetry have carried our sounds and stories, our loves and losses for generations. Now Anne Kennedy brings together for the first time a selection of over 200 poems from Aotearoa to learn by heart – whakataukī and odes, poems of love and of nature, of whānau, history and politics.

For a wedding, a tangi, for a day at school or an evening at home,  $Remember\ Me$  will be a lively poetic companion for years to come.

Recipient of a Prime Minister's Award for Literary Achievement, **Anne Kennedy** is the author of four novels, a novella, anthologised short stories and five collections of poetry. She is the two-time winner of the New Zealand Book Award for Poetry, and her latest book, *The Sea Walks into the Wall*, was shortlisted for the 2022 Ockham New Zealand Book Awards.

## Don Binney Flight Path


## A richly illustrated account of the life and work of one of New Zealand's most iconic artists.

Painter, printmaker, teacher, writer and ornithologist, Don Binney (1940–2012) was a mercurial presence on the New Zealand cultural scene from the time of his meteoric rise to fame in the early 1960s. His unmistakable, stylised depictions of birds have come to define an era in the development of the nation's art.

Don Binney: Flight Path follows the painter from Te Henga / Bethells Beach – his artistic tūrangawaewae – through his years of wandering not only the length of Aotearoa but as far afield as Latin America and Europe. Drawing extensively on Binney's letters, journals and other writings, award-winning author and curator Gregory O'Brien takes us into the world of this gifted but paradoxical artist.

 $Filled with Binney's paintings, drawings and prints-alongside photographs and documentary \\ materials-this is the first full-length monograph on one of New Zealand's most important twentieth-century artists.$ 

**Gregory O'Brien** is a writer, painter and art curator. Alongside his poetry and painting, he has written books on New Zealand art and artists. He became an Arts Foundation Laureate and won the Prime Minister's Award for Literary Achievement in 2012, and in 2017 became a Member of the New Zealand Order of Merit and received an honorary doctorate from Victoria University of Wellington.



## Knowledge Is a Blessing on Your Mind

## A collection of Dame Anne Salmond's writings over forty years – from *Hui* and *Eruera*, through *The Trial of the Cannibal Dog* and to today's debates about race and Te Tiriti.


For fifty years, Dame Anne Salmond has navigated 'te ao hurihuri' – travelling to hui in her little blue VW Beetle with Eruera and Amiria Stirling in the 1970s, working for a university marae alongside Merimeri Penfold, Patu Hohepa and Wharetoroa Kerr in the 1980s, giving evidence to the Waitangi Tribunal on the meaning of Te Tiriti in the 2000s.

This book traces Anne Salmond's journey as an anthropologist, as a writer and activist, as a Pākehā New Zealander, as a friend, wife and mother. The book brings together her key writing on the Māori world, cultural contact, Te Tiriti and the wider Pacific – much of it appearing in book form for the first time – and embeds these writings in her life and relationships, her travels and friends.

This is the story of Aotearoa and the story of one woman's pathway through our changing land.

**Dame Anne Salmond** is Distinguished Professor at the University of Auckland. In 2013 she became New Zealander of the Year and winner of the Rutherford Medal from the Royal Society of New Zealand. She received the CBE in 1988, was made Dame Commander of the British Empire in 1995, and in 2020 she became a member of the Order of New Zealand (ONZ).

## The Best Country to Give Birth?

Midwifery, Homebirth and the Politics of Maternity in Aotearoa New Zealand, 1970-2022


#### The history of a momentous change in New Zealand's maternity care.

Is New Zealand 'the best country to give birth'? Historian of medicine Linda Bryder explores how New Zealand developed a unique approach to the role of midwives in childbirth in the 1990s, and analyses the consequences of that change for mothers and babies.

The Best Country to Give Birth? traces the genesis of the 1990 Nurses Amendment Act, which allowed midwives to practise alone in the community, back to the homebirth movement of the 1970s, and explores the aftermath of the Act including the withdrawal of GPs from maternity care. In investigating the consequences of the reforms, it uncovers repeated criticism of services - and what were deemed preventable deaths - from coroners, commissioners for health and disability, other health professionals including some midwives, academic researchers, and parents and families.

How and why does maternity care in Aotearoa differ from other countries? How has it shaped the equitable care of our mothers and babies? Why have critical reports had so little impact? This is a major historical account of an issue at the heart of our maternity care.

Linda Bryder is a professor of history at the University of Auckland and has an extensive publication list in the social history of health and medicine, including over one hundred peer-reviewed journal articles and book chapters, and significant monographs in the history of women and children's health.

An Anthology of Performance Poetry from Aotearoa New Zealand

#### A snapshot of performance poetry from Aotearoa New Zealand.

From the South Auckland Poets Collective to regional writers festivals, at poetry slams and open mic nights, in theatre works like Show Ponies and Wild Dogs Under My Skirt, performance poetry has taken off in Aotearoa.


In this anthology, ninety performance poets, rappers, spoken-word artists, slam poets, theatre makers, genre blenders and storytellers come together to celebrate the diverse voices and communities within Aotearoa - including Ben Brown and Mohamed Hassan, Grace Iwashita-Taylor and Tusiata Avia, Nathan Joe and Dominic Hoey, Freya Daly Sadgrove, David Eggleton and Selina Tusitala Marsh.

Rapture is a parallel narrative about contemporary poetry in Aotearoa – one that doesn't just sit on the page, but leaps from it.

Carrie Rudzinski has performed her work over the past 17 years in six countries and she has been featured in Bustle, HuffPost and Teen Vogue. Carrie is the co-creator of three poetry theatre shows - How We Survive (2019), The Bitching Hour (2023), and Hysterical (2022) - the latter of which won Best New Aotearoa Play at the Wellington Theatre Awards and Outstanding Performance Poetry at Auckland Fringe Festival.

Grace Iwashita-Taylor, breathing bloodlines of Samoa, England and Japan. She is an artist of upu/ words on the page, digital storytelling, and live performance. 

Since the first brew by Captain James Cook and the crew of the *Resolution* at Dusky Sound in April 1773, the story of beer has been deeply intertwined with the history of Aotearoa – from the early settlers' prodigious consumption of golden ale to the six o'clock swill, from prohibition to the 'Black Budget', from the domination of Lion and DB to the rise of craft beer.

In this remarkable story of New Zealanders and beer, Greg Ryan tackles the big questions: Why did people drink and did they do so excessively by contemporary international standards? What did people drink and in what circumstances? How did tastes change over time? What role did brewers and publicans play in the community other than as dispensers of alcohol?

**Greg Ryan** is a professor of history and proctor at Lincoln University. With Geoff Watson he is author of *Sport and the New Zealanders: A History* (Auckland University Press, 2018) – winner of the Australian Society for Sports History Book Award 2019.
